THE HENRY BARNARD PRIZE: This prize of \$500 is awarded biennially to the best essay in the history of education by a graduate student. The next award will be presented at the fall 1997 meeting of the History of Education Society. The recipient will have the essay published in the *History of Education Quarterly*.

The Society reserves the right not to make awards in years when the Prize Committee judges all entries to be of insufficient quality.

OUTSTANDING BOOK AWARD: This award of \$500 is made biennially to the author of the best book published in the two previous years.
