Law of Peace

N. A. Maryan Green

This volume provides a concise but comprehensive survey of the whole body of known and accepted law in the field of contemporary Law of Peace. The author has attempted to distill and relate as briefly and as clearly as possible the rules and principles themselves rather than discuss or analyze their adequacy or effect. The plan of the book follows an internationally agreed model worked out by the Council of Europe, and includes a full and accurate index together with a Table of Cases and a comprehensive Table of Treaties featuring practical information as to their state of ratification or signature. Footnotes have been omitted to leave the presentation as unencumbered and easy to follow as possible.

Developments in recent years have necessitated a thorough revision of the text, especially in regard to the section on the Law of the Sea. This second edition now incorporates the findings of the 1979 Session of the U.N. Conference on the Law of the Sea, as well as taking into account the Vienna Convention on the Succession of States in respect to Treaties, and the question of jurisdiction before the International Court of Justice.

The book is primarily intended as an introductory text for students taking international law as part of their course. It will also be useful as a ready reference work for diplomats, persons concerned with international organizations and lawyers with international practice.

N.A. Maryan Green was an official in the Council of Europe, where his work included the drafting of new treaties between European states. He has been awarded the Hague Diploma in International Law and is now practicing at the English/French Bar.
