#### THE TANIGUCHI FOUNDATION'S INTERNATIONAL SYMPOSIA

Mr. Toyosaburo Taniguchi, chairman emeritus of the board of the Toyobo Corporation, established the Taniguchi Foundation in 1929 with his personal funds, in accordance with the will of his late father, who was the founder of the Toyobo Spinning Company. Among other projects, the Foundation has financed international symposia for many years and at present supports fourteen symposia. The aim of these symposia is to contribute to the development of specific academic fields which are not necessarily in the limelight of popular interest, which means those fields having low funds.

Each symposium is held annually for at least ten years in order to develop its field and increase international goodwill and co-operation. At the same time, it is hoped to promote a better understanding among young scholars on the international level, giving them an opportunity to get together and exchange ideas. The symposia are not open to the public, and the number of invited participants is limited to discussion-group size to allow maximum flow of communication and personal acquaintance. Each symposium lasts about a week.

A symposium on medical history is one of the fourteen, and a different topic is chosen each year. On 19–26 September 1982, the Seventh International Symposium on the Comparative History of Medicine – East and West was held, its theme being "The History of Obstetrics". Ten papers were presented, by participants from Thailand, the UK, Japan, France, the USA, China, and West Germany. In fact, Marianne Theodore Charlotte Heidenreich-von Siebold (née Heiland) was born in 1788 and died in 1859. (See W.
