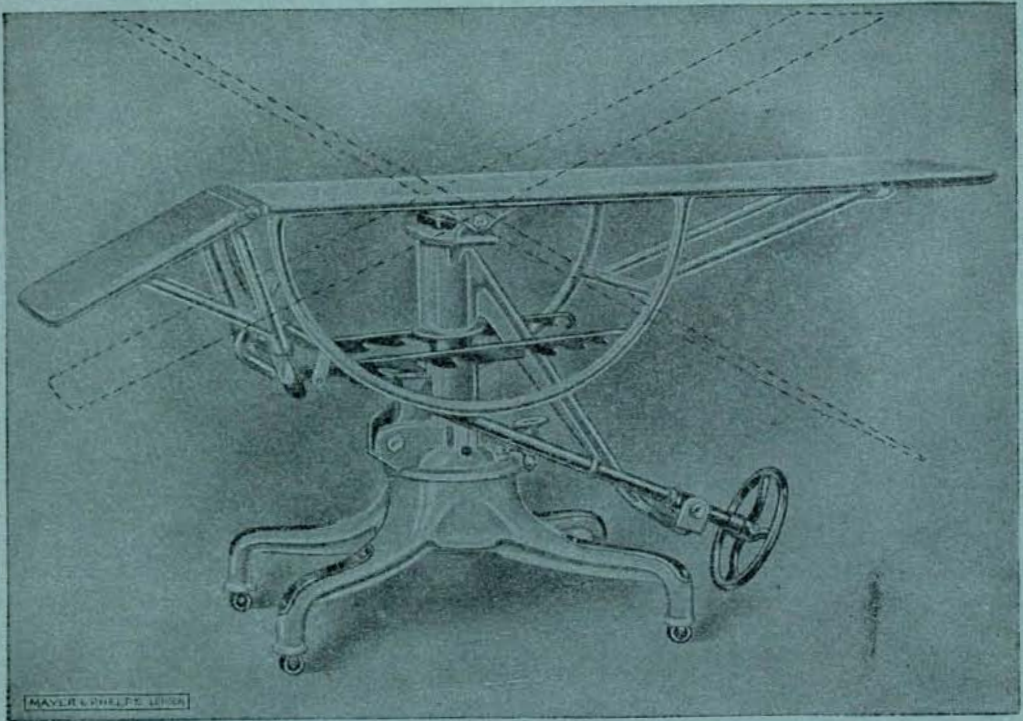

Peroral Endoscopy Table

Designed and built at Chiron Works for King's College Hospital



This table is arranged for nasal and aural operations as well as for endoscopic work.

The back rest is adjustable from the dependant position shown in the illustration to one nearly at right angles to the top of the table for nasal operations, in which case a suitable head rest is attached.

The table is adjustable in height and can be tilted in either direction and is absolutely rigid in any position. Further particulars furnished on request.
