The Society was founded in 1879 to advance the study of Greek language, literature, history and art. It maintains conjointly with the Society for the Promotion of Roman Studies, and in association with the Institute of Classical Studies of the University of London a Library of some 80,000 volumes with *c*. 480 current periodicals, and a collection of over 6,300 coloured slides, including sets of slides with notes, and film-strips. The Classical Association

The main aims of the Classical Association are to promote and sustain interest in classical studies, to maintain their rightful position in universities and schools, and to give scholars and teachers opportunities of meeting and discussing their problems. It organizes an annual conference, lasting four or five days, in a university centre, and sponsors some thirty branches, most of which hold Greek and Latin Reading Competitions for Schools.
