CALL FOR PAPERS

The Twenty-sixth Annual Economic and Business Historical Society Conference will be held 26–28 April 2001 in Albany, New York, at the Crowne Plaza Hotel. Participants are encouraged to explore the rich economic, political, and cultural heritage of the city, and are invited to join us for an excursion to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York.

The president and program chair for 2000–2001, Larry Malone of Hartwick College, invites proposals for papers or sessions on all aspects of business and economic history, domestic and international. Requests for places on the program should include an abstract (no more than two pages) and a curriculum vitae, postal and e-mail addresses, and telephone and fax numbers for each proposed participant. Panel proposals should suggest a title and a panel Chair. Graduate students and nonacademic affiliates are welcome. THE LIBRARY COMPANY OF PHILADELPHIA'S PROGRAM IN EARLY AMERICAN ECONOMY AND SOCIETY

The Library Company of Philadelphia will award one dissertation fellowship and one advanced research fellowship, tenable for nine consecutive months from September 2001 to May 2002 and carrying stipends of \$15,000 and \$30,000, respectively. The program will also award four one-month research fellowships carrying stipends of \$1,500, tenable from June 2001 to May 2002.

Designed to promote scholarship on the origins and development of early American business and the economy to roughly 1850, these fellowships will provide scholars the opportunity to use the extensive printed and manuscript collections related to the history

of commerce, finance, technology, manufacturing, agriculture, internal improvements, and economic policy-making that are held by the Library Company and by numerous other institutions in its vicinity.

The application deadline is 1 March 2001, with a decision to be made by 15 April. To apply, send four copies each of a curriculum vitae, a detailed description of the nature of the research to be undertaken during the fellowship period, a relevant writing sample of no more than 25 pages, and two letters of recommendation sent by separate mail to: The Library Company of Philadelphia, Program in Early American Economy and Society, 1314 Locust Street, Philadelphia, PA 19107.
