


Since the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 was enacted, policy makers and academics from a broad range of disciplines have debated and researched the implications of welfare reform in the United States. Most of the attention, however, has focused on urban rather than rural America. *Welfare Reform in Persistent Rural Poverty* examines welfare participants who live in chronically poor rural areas of the United States.

Kathleen Pickering and her colleagues look at welfare reform as it has been experienced in four rural and impoverished regions of the United States: American Indian reservations in South Dakota, the Rio Grande region, Appalachian Kentucky, and the Mississippi Delta. Throughout these areas the rhetoric of reform created expectations of new opportunities to find decent work and receive education and training. In fact, these expectations have largely gone unfulfilled as welfare reform has failed to penetrate poor areas where low-income families remain isolated from the economic mainstream of American society.

Welfare Reform in Persistent Rural Poverty sheds welcome light on the opportunities and challenges that welfare reform has imposed on lowincome families situated in disadvantaged areas. PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING IN BRAZIL

CONTESTATION, COOPERATION, AND ACCOUNTABILITY Brian Wampler

"With its comparative analysis of eight cases of participatory budgeting (PB) in Brazil, varying from success to failure, Wampler's book is a significant contribution to a literature heretofore dominated by single-case or two-case analyses (usually of only successful cases). In this first rigorous comparative study of the phenomenon, Brian Wampler draws evidence from eight municipalities in Brazil to show the varying degrees of success and failure PB has experienced. He identifies why some PB programs have done better than others in achieving the twin goals of ensuring governmental accountability and empowering citizenship rights for the poor residents of these cities in the quest for greater social justice and a well-functioning democracy. Conducting extensive interviews, applying a survey to 650 PB delegates, doing detailed analysis of budgets, and engaging in participant observation, Wampler finds that the three most important factors explaining the variation are the incentives for mayoral administrations to delegate authority, the way civil society organizations and citizens respond to the new institutions, and the particular rule structure that is used to delegate authority to citizens.
