# INTERNATIONAL CLINIC OF OTO-RHINO-LARYNGOLOGY AND FACIO-MAXILLARY SURGERY.

This newly-formed International Clinic has recently published its programme of instruction for 1925. Recognising that a large number of specialists who visit Europe each year are handicapped by the necessity of travelling between different centres and by their want of familiarity with the various continental languages, the founders of the Clinic have organised two curricula in 1925, in which instruction will be given in English by teachers of recognised reputation.

Both courses will be given in Paris and will be taken part in by members of the staffs of the different hospitals in the City and by others who have

been invited to lecture upon their particular specialties. The arrangements are under the direction of Dr Fernand Lemaître of the Hôpital St Louis, 40 Rue Bichat. The Course of instruction in Oto-Rhino-Laryngology will extend from the 15th January to the 15th May, and that in Facio-Maxillary Surgery from the 15th May to the 30th June. The Courses will include lectures, clinical and operative work, and laboratory attendance. The teaching staff, in addition to those resident in Paris, will include Sir StClair Thomson, Dr Cornelius Coakley, Dr Chevalier Jackson, Dr Greenfield Sluder, Dr George E. Shambaugh, Mr H. D. Gillies, Mr Ferris Smith, and Mr J. Eastman Sheehan.

# NEW EAR, NOSE AND THROAT HOSPITAL.

The following letter from Mr Geoffrey E. Duveen appeared in *The Times* of Thursday 4th December, 1924.

GENTLEMEN,—I am desirous of perpetuating the memory of my late father, Henry J. Duveen, by giving a sum of £50,000 for the construction and equipment of a new Ear, Nose, and Throat Hospital to replace the present obsolete and inadequate accommodation of the Royal Ear Hospital in Dean Street, which, in 1920, was incorporated as the Ear, Nose, and Throat Department of University College Hospital.

This gift is in addition to the £15,000 which I gave last year for the purpose of providing a suitable site adjoining your new Rockefeller buildings in Huntley Street, and to the £10,000 which I gave to the University of London for the establishment and endowment of a Chair of Otology.

I make these gifts in order to secure a much-needed improvement in this country of the facilities for treatment, teaching, and research in connection with diseases of the ear, nose, and throat.

I have selected University College Hospital for this benefaction because it has already been selected by the Rockefeller Foundation as the medium for carrying out their great Imperial scheme of medical education, and because I desire in my relatively small way to make a personal contribution to the great object which their splendid generosity has initiated in this country.—Yours faithfully,

#### THE TUBERCULOSIS CLINICS, NEW YORK CITY.


We learn from the Bulletin of the New York Tuberculosis Association that the Nose and Throat Service of the Tuberculosis Clinics of the Department of Health is undergoing a process of re-organisation. A number of these clinics have been, hitherto, without the special service of a nose and throat surgeon. Consequently, a complete diagnosis in every case has not been possible. With the increase in the medical staff a more thorough and satisfactory examination will become possible, and the case records will be rendered more valuable with the aid of a uniform method of procedure in the various services.
