Frank Cancian. This study of economic change in a southern Mexico community stresses the influence of uncertainty on the decisions made by farmers in response to new economic opportunities provided by government improvement programs. The author first gives a detailed ethnographic description of various aspects of corn farming as of 1966. He then focuses on the changes that took place between 1957 and 1966 as the result of road-building and corn-buying programs. A final chapter develops and tests a theory relating behavior under conditions of uncertainty to rank in an economic stratification system. Illustrated. \$7.95
