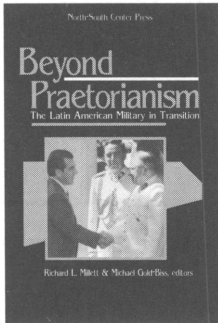

The realities of the post-Cold War world have presented Latin American militaries with new, unsettling realities: diminished threats from insurgencies, governments' inability to control the flow of information, the necessity of operating within a global economic system, and a lost ability by weaker states to

manipulate external actors. These conditions are placing military institutions under pressure to support efforts at peace negotiation, to accept significant reductions in strength and budgets, to reduce their roles in the political process, and to re-examine their traditional immunities and autonomy. This volume examines all of these factors and offers possible scenarios for regional developments.

Richard L. Millett is professor of history, Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, and a senior research associate at the North-South Center, University of Miami.

Michael Gold-Biss, a native of Colombia, is assistant professor of political science at St. Cloud State University, Minnesota.
