In Memoriam

George S. Blair

George Blair was born and grew up on the plains of Kansas where he was bred in the legacy of the plain word, straightforward language, and old fashioned common sense. George migrated to Northwestern University where he received his Ph.D. in 1951. He then held a number of academic appointments at the University of Tennessee and the University of Pennsylvania at which he served as the educational director of the Fels Institute of Local and State Government.

In 1960, George came to the Claremont Graduate School as a member of the government program that he chaired until 1984. Already the author of two books when he came to Claremont, George continued to be a public writer eventually authoring eight books, two of which are considered to be standard reading for students studying democracy and California government today: *Cumu*-
