The Price of Progress in a Japanese Village, 1951-1975

Robert J. Smith. Returning in 1975 to a remote village he had first studied in 1951, the author found the quality of life there drastically altered, not only by the advent of television and modern gadgets but by the decline of the religious observances, social customs, and family relationships that had once given the village a strong sense of community. This latest Cambridge History is one of the most far-reaching works of international scholarship ever undertaken and it will open a new era in the understanding of the Chinese past. Volume 10, the first to be published, covers the period from 1800 to about 1870 when the Western world first made a profound impact on China. The period was characterised by the dynastic decline of the Ch'in Empire and by domestic revolt, culminating in the Taiping rebellion. The authors survey the Opium War and the treaty system whereby the victorious Western powers occupied the principal ports. Central Asian developments are also studied, as is the successful restoration of imperial power following the collapse of the Taiping forces. Numerous maps illustrate the text and each chapter has a separate bibliographical essay. £30.00 net
