FELLOWSHIPS

The Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars will be awarding approximately 40 residential fellowships in the humanities and social sciences. Applicants must hold a doctorate or have equivalent professional accomplishments. Fellows are provided offices, access to the Library of Congress, and other research facilities, manuscript typing services, computers, and research assistants. The Center also helps Fellows locate appropriate housing. Fellowships normally last for an academic year, though a few may run for a minimum of four months to a maximum of twelve. Stipends follow the principle of no gain/no loss in terms of a Fellow's previous year's salary, although limited funds make it desirable for most applicants to seek supplementary sources of funding, such as sabbatical support or grants from other sources. Travel expenses are provided. The application deadline for 1990–1991 is 1 October 1989. The Columbia Society of Fellows in the Humanities will appoint a number of postdoctoral Fellows in the humanities for the academic year 1990–1991. The Fellows newly appointed must have received the Ph.D. between 1 January 1985 and 1 July 1990. Appointment carries with it the expectation of renewal for a second year. The stipend will be \$29,500, one-half for independent research and one-half for teaching in the undergraduate program in general education. Additional funds are available to support research. The deadline for applications is 15 October 1989.
