This volume is planned as the first of several with the aim of consolidating the ground covered in *Aeschylus and Athens*. It is in effect an expansion of the first five chapters of that work, reinforcing the argument and treating at length some fundamental problems that were only touched on there, especially matriarchy, land-tenure, Aegean pre-history, and epic. Its range coincides approximately with the Bronze Age, except that the evolution of epic is followed down to its culmination in the sixth century B.C.
