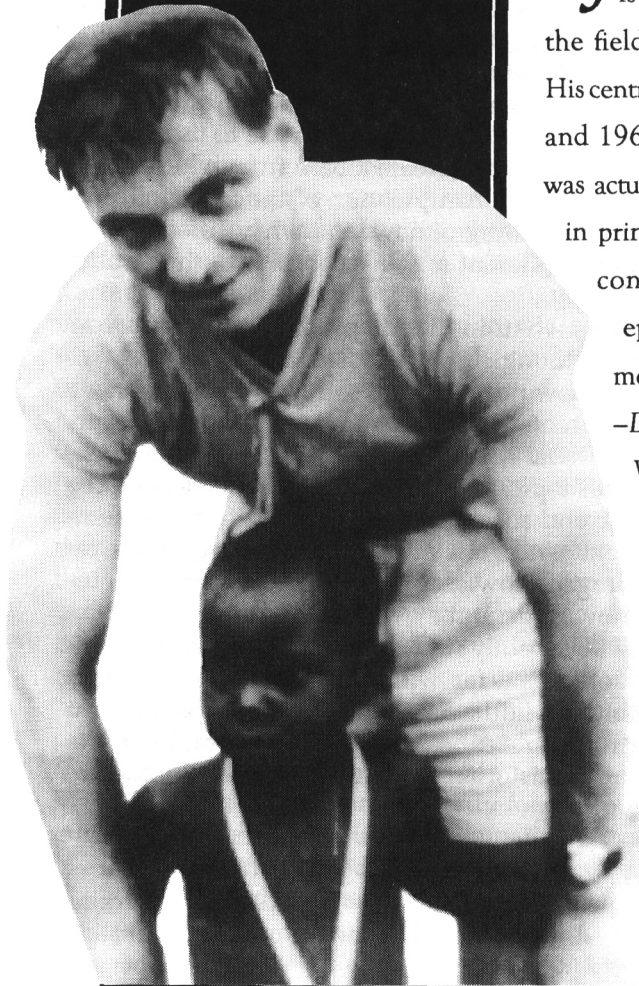

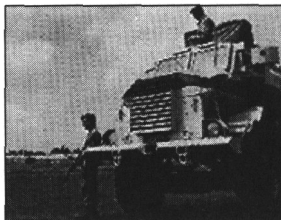

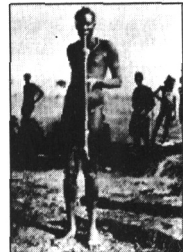
A History of Prophecy from the Upper Nile in the Nineteenth and Twentieth Centuries
