The Department of Psychiatric Mental Health Services at the Western Regional Health Centre is currently seeking a psychiatrist to join our presently full complement of six psychiatrists. We provide comprehensive psychiatric services to Southwest Nova Scotia (population 70,000). These services include: a 22 bed acute inpatient psychiatry ward, day hospital, and outpatient clinic at the Yarmouth Regional Hospital, three satellite clinics, institutional and general hospital consultation as well as a child and adolescent services.

We are seeking a general psychiatrist with leadership qualities who is a member of the Royal College of Psychiatrists. Candidates who have passed the Medical Council of Canada Evaluating Examination (MCCEE) are preferred.

The recent introduction of remuneration through a contract arrangement makes this a very attractive position as it significantly enhances the potential salary – \$111,500-\$140,000 on a 37.5 hour work week and may be augmented with extra reimbursement for call back. On call responsibilities normally require a commitment of one weekend in six. In addition, extra billing may be available where staff complement permits and private practice is possible. The option also continues to exist for applicants who prefer a salary arrangement with a full range of benefits rather than a contract basis. Assistance with moving expenses is also available.

This position would be particularly attractive to someone who is concerned about a good work environment, combined with time for personal interests and who is looking for a place to go for a long term quality lifestyle in a small town rural setting.

Yarmouth is an attractive seaport town which has convenient transportation facilities including an international airport.
