



The Association also selected 23 federal executives as Congressional





Political Scientists and Journalists Winners of Designated Congressional Fellowships

William J. Drake and Diana M. Owen Named APSA-MCI Communications Congressional Fellows

William J. Drake, Assistant Professor, Department of Communication, University of California, San Diego; and Diana M. Owen, Assistant Professor, Department of Government, Georgetown University, have been named the 1995–96 APSA-MCI Communications Congressional Fellows.

Drake has been Assistant Professor, University of California, San Diego, since 1987. He received his Bachelor's degree in political science from Northwestern University in 1979 and his M.A. (1982) and Ph.D. (1989) from Columbia University. He has published extensively on the policies and technology of global communications and received awards for research in Ge-

neva, the United Kingdom, France, Germany and Belgium.

Owen taught political science at Rutgers University before accepting her position at Georgetown. She earned her Bachelor's degree in political science with special honors from The George Washington University in 1980 and her M.A. (1982) and Ph.D. (1986) from the University of Wisconsin-Madison where she also received the University's Distinguished Teaching Award.

The Fellowship is awarded to an outstanding broadcast journalist through annual national competition.

At one time, he was media relations coordinator for the Mississippi Department of Energy and Transportation. Frederick Carl Walton: William A. Steiger Congressional Fellow

Frederick Carl Walton, Assistant Professor, Department of Political Science, University of Georgia, is the recipient of the 1995–96 William A. Steiger Congressional Fellowship, awarded annually to an outstanding political scientist or journalist.

Walton joined the faculty of the University of Georgia, Athens, in September 1994. He earned his Bachelor's degree (magna cum laude) from Morris Brown College in 1984 and his Master's degree from Purdue University in 1990. The recipient of a doctoral fellowship from Purdue, Dr. Walton received his Ph.D. from that institution in 1994.

The William A. Steiger Fellowship honors the memory of William A. Steiger, a Republican who represented the Sixth District of Wisconsin from 1966 until his untimely death in 1978. During his service in Congress, Representative Steiger was dedicated to the Congressional Fellowship Program and was an active member of its advisory committee. The Fellowship is awarded annually to a political scientist or journalist who best exemplifies Representative Steiger's values and interests.

Fundraising for the William A. Steiger Congressional Fellowship is

under the direction of the William A. Steiger Congressional Fellowship Development Committee, which seeks to raise an endowment to support the Fellowship in perpetuity. The Fellowship fund receives contributions annually from former Congressional Fellows and other friends of the Congressional Fellowship Program.

All designated fellowships are awarded through national competition.

1995 Ralph Bunche Summer Institute

Fourteen exceptional juniors who have demonstrated potential in the field of political science participated in the ninth annual APSA Summer Institute in Political Science for African American Students. The Summer Institute is in honor of Ralph Bunche, winner of the Nobel Peace Prize and former APSA President.

1995 Research Support Grants Announced

The APSA Research Support Committee recently made awards totaling \$15,000 under APSA's program to support research by political scientists outside of Ph.D.-granting research institutions. APSA Research Support Awards are merit based. Projects supported this year include studies of the Chinese reform movement, the electoral bases of public expenditures in Guatemala, the politics of breast cancer, and church and state in five democracies. The Committee funded 12 proposals out of the 52 projects submitted this year.

APSA Research Grant awards are supported entirely by Association general revenues—that is by member dues—as one of the many facets of the Association's commitment to assuring scholarly opportunities for all. Applicants must be APSA members, and either a faculty member at a college or university that does not award a Ph.D. in political science, or an independent scholar not affiliated with an academic institution.

The Committee reported to the
