EDITOR'S NOTE

Authors are advised of the following changes in the style of referencing which appear in the third edition of the American Psychological Association's Publication Manual, and will be adopted by the Canadian Journal on Aging, beginning with Volume 3 (1984).

- The year of publication is placed immediately after the author's name.
 e.g. Stones, M.J. & Kozma, A. (1982). Sex differences in changes with age in record running performances. Canadian Journal on Aging, 1 (3 & 4), 12-16.
- 2) The inclusive page numbers of a chapter or article in a book are provided in parentheses after the title.
 - e.g. Schwenger, C.W. & Gross, M.J. (1980). Institutional care and institutionalization of the elderly in Canada. In V.W. Marshall (Ed.), *Aging in Canada: Social Perspectives* (pp. 248–256). Don Mills, Ont.: Fitzhenry and Whiteside.
- Personal communications are mentioned only in the text; however, all other references, including reference notes, are incorporated into the reference list.

Style of Referencing

The references cited in articles submitted to the Psychology, Social Science and Social Welfare sections, should conform to the style described in the 3rd edition of the American Psychological Association's Publication Manual. Those manuscripts submitted to the Biological and Health Science sections will continue to be written in either the Vancouver (i.e. U.S. National Library of Medicine) style, or in the APA style, as appropriate.

Translation of Abstracts

It is requested that both English and French abstracts be submitted at the time of submission of paper. If not submitted, the Editor-in-Chief will assume that the Abstract is to be translated at the author's expense.

Policy Note

It should also be noted that the policy for manuscripts submitted by associate editors for publication is to have the Editor-in-Chief assume the responsibility for the reviews and general processing of the papers in question.
