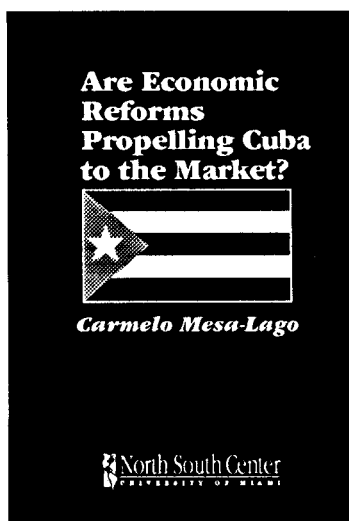

ARE ECONOMIC REFORMS PROPELLING CUBA TO THE MARKET?

Carmelo Mesa-Lago

A leading analyst of contemporary Cuba offers the latest observations on Cuba's economic future. Carmelo Mesa-Lago is Distinguished Service Professor of Economics and Latin American Studies at the University of Pittsburgh and the Emilio Barcardí Visiting Professor at the University of Miami Graduate School of International Studies for fall 1994. This monograph provides his latest views on Cuba's economic future, based upon the Cuban government's external economic strategy and its domestic reforms. Written in early 1994, the work highlights the disastrous economic impact on Cuba of the collapse of Eastern European socialism and the disappearance of the USSR and examines the ability of Cuba's leadership to adopt and enforce a comprehensive, integrated reform package. It uses a cost/benefit balance sheet of advantages and disadvantages to evaluate both the internal and external reforms. Dr. Mesa-Lago provides an overall assessment of the reforms and identifies key issues with which Cubans will likely cope in the near future.

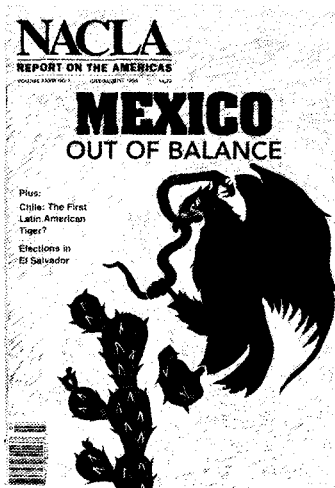
