Genetics appears high in the list of sciences that have developed rapidly during the past few years. Although scientists have readily adopted the new techniques devised for this study they have made little use of comparative research on the hereditary characteristics of the human species and other primates. It is certain that this approach offers another valid means of improving the progress in this area, which is of great importance to the future of Mankind.

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Introduction. Comparative primate genetics and human heredity. Epigenetic polymorphism in the primate skeleton. The heredity of dermatoglyphic traits in non-human primates and man. Phenylthiourea testing in primates. Blood groups of non-human primates and their relationship to the blood groups of man. Leukocyte groups of non-human primates; their relation to histocompatibility and to human HL-A antigens. Genetic structure and systematics of some macaques and men. Evolving primate genes and proteins. Comparison of the hemoglobins in non-human primates and their importance in the study of human hemoglobins. Phylogenesis of immunoglobulins in primates. Comparative cytogenetics in primates and its relevance for human cytogenetics.
