Black Political Scientists Discuss Conservatism

The National Conference of Black Political Scientists held their 12th Annual Meeting at the Fountain Bay Club Hotel in New Orleans, April 21-24. The theme of the meeting was "Black Politics and Conservatism: Coalition or Confrontation."

This is the second year that the National Conference has met jointly with the African Heritage Studies Association, whose meeting theme was "African World Struggles in the 1980s: Different Aspects of Our Destiny."

The joint conference was punctuated by a series of plenary sessions, the first of which examined the national and international dimensions of the relationship between blacks and Reaganism. Jewel Prestage of Southern University chaired that session. Discussant Eddie Williams, director of the Joint Center for Political Studies, followed Kalamu Ya Salaam, editor of Black Collegian, who delivered the main address at this session.

Other plenary sessions included: "A New Vision of Africa," chaired by W. Ofuatey-Kodjoe of Queens College; "Black Politi-

cal Action: Affirmative Action and Independent Action," chaired by Shelby Lewis of Atlanta University with an address by Mary Berry of the U.S. Civil Rights Commission; "The Relevance of AHSA in the Black Struggle," chaired by Jan Douglass of the Atlanta Community Relations Commission; and a keynote address at the awards luncheon on "U.S. Foreign Policy towards Southern Africa," given by Randall Robinson, executive director of TRANSAFRICA.
