## Travel Grants Allow Extensive Foreign Scholar Participation at Annual Meeting

Grants from several sources allowed 69 foreign scholars and graduate students to attend the annual meeting in San Francisco. The support extended to scholars and students from the USSR, Romania, Yugoslavia, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria, Hungary, West Germany, The Netherlands, Japan, Hong Kong, Korea, Taiwan, Philippines, People's Republic of China, Indonesia, Thailand, Canada, Brazil, Barbados, Chile, Argentina, South Africa, Ghana, Israel, and Lebanon.

Support from the MacArthur Foundation allowed a delegation of Eastern European scholars to attend, from IREX for a delegation of Hungarian scholars, from the Japan-U.S. Friendship Commission for Japanese scholars, the German Marshall Fund for a West German scholar, the Ford Foundation for international scholars, the Asia Foundation and the APSA Council for travel to foreign graduate students studying in the United States.

### Faculty Seminar on Japanese Politics Held in Conjunction with Annual Meeting

An intensive three-day seminar on Japanese political institutions and behavior was held prior to the start of the APSA annual meeting in San Francisco which allowed American faculty to work with Japanese scholars on ways to incorporate Japan into undergraduate courses in comparative politics.

The seminar was lead by Kent E. Calder, Princeton University. The project was supported by a grant from the Japan-United States Friendship Commission, which provided travel support and living
