The following African languages are at present being taught at the School :—Amharic, Arabic, Dinka, Duala, Efik, Fanti, Hausa, Ibo, Kikuyu, Luganda, Mende, Nuer, Sechuana, Sesuto, Swahili, Twi, Xosa, Yoruba, and Zulu. Arrangements can generally be made for other languages, if desired.

The Department of AFRICAN LINGUISTICS is carrying on research into the structure of many African languages. Enquiries and co-operation are welcome.
