

budgetary surplus every year since Tom became executive director. Political scientists are indeed indebted to him," Huntington continued.

Tom Mann came to Washington in 1969 on a Congressional Fellowship. Since that time he has worked at APSA in a variety of positions, including director of the Congressional Fellowship Program. Mann was named executive director in 1981.

"My years at APSA have been enjoyable and rewarding. As much as I hate to leave, I look forward to the exciting challenge ahead," Mann said. "And I'll just be around the corner," he quipped. (Brookings is located two blocks from APSA's national office.)

In addition to his work at APSA, Mann has served as co-director of the Congress Project at the American Enterprise Institute and taught at several Washington-area universities. He has written and edited a number of books and articles on congressional elections, Congress and democratic politics.

APSA, Pi Sigma Alpha Seek Oral History Director

The American Political Science Association and Pi Sigma Alpha announce a search for Project Director of the profession's oral history project on the development of the discipline of political science. The individual selected for the position should have a demonstrated interest in the area of oral history and the profession of political science and be able to secure some released time, office space and equipment, and clerical assistance from his or her institution.

The Project Director will assume active management of the oral history project, including the scheduling, transcription and editing of new interviews, the maintenance and dissemination of released transcripts, and the preparation of monographs for student use from the oral histories. Overall policy guidelines for the project will be provided by an advisory committee composed of representatives from APSA and Pi Sigma Alpha.

The profession's oral history project was

initiated in 1978 by the American Political Science Association. In 1981 it was transferred to Pi Sigma Alpha which has provided most of the financing for that project since its inception. An extensive number of interviews already have been conducted. Excerpts of interviews with Gabriel Almond, Gwendolen Carter, James Fesler, Pendleton Herring, Charles Hyneman, Don K. Price, and David Truman have appeared in the *NEWS for Teachers of Political Science*.

Kirkpatrick Fund Tops \$65,000

A special fundraising drive on the occasion of Evron M. Kirkpatrick's 75th birth-

day in August has brought the endowment for the Kirkpatrick Fund to over \$65,000.

The Council established the Evron M. Kirkpatrick Fund in the fall of 1981 in appreciation and recognition of his "twenty-seven years of distinguished service to the Association as executive director, during which time he played an important role in fostering the growth and development of political science as a discipline and a profession, and in recognition of his own lively interest and accomplishments in the philosophy and intellectual history of political science."

The Board of Trustees of the Kirkpatrick Fund, chaired by Walter E. Beach of the Brookings Institution, is developing two projects with the Fund's earnings—the Oral History Project (see related story above) and a monograph series on the craft of political science. Further details on these two activities will be announced in subsequent issues of *PS*.
