- dispute to keep the Committee's involvement in strict confidence.
- 1.4 When the occasion warrants, the Committee, after completing its preliminary investigation, will appoint a Special Representative having the judgment and sensitivity necessary to win the confidence of those involved to conduct a comprehensive inquiry into the case.
- 1.4 [a] A Special Representative's first duty is to try to resolve the complaint. A Special Representative always approaches a dispute as a fact-finder and mediator, not as an advocate for either side. Special Representatives compile a thorough report of their investigation for the use of the Committee.
- 1.5 At the completion of the fact-finding done by the Committee and its representatives, the Ethics Committee will take any actions it can to support those individuals it concludes have been treated unfairly by other persons or institutions.
- 1.5 [a] The Committee does not have the power to censure individuals, departments or institutions. It does make every effort to use persuasion and vigorous protest to rectify situations that violate ethical principles.
- 1.5 [b] Inasmuch as the Committee aims for mediation, situations may arise when the Committee will advise the complainant that the best course is to pursue the matter through the American Association of University Professors or to adopt another course of action.
- 13. Independent Statements and Actions by Organized Sections

Jun Yin presented on behalf of the Committee on Organized Sections a proposal for a policy on independent statements or actions by Organized Sections. The policy reads:

A. Any time scholars in an Organized Section wish to express a public position, they may constitute themselves as an independent group of scholars and speak as they wish. The infrastructure of the Organized Section may be a useful tool for conducting discussion or debate about such issues, or announcing the formation of an independent group.

- B. If the Organized Section would like to speak out in its own name as an Organized Section of APSA, its position must be consistent with the APSA Constitution and legal status, and the Section must include a disclaimer in its statements that its views do not necessarily represent those of the APSA.
- C. If an Organized Section wishes APSA as a whole to make a public statement, the position must be approved and expressed by the APSA Officers or Council, through whatever procedures they endorse.

Council action: The Council endorsed these guidelines.

14. APSA Minority Fellows 1997-98

Maurice Woodard reported to the Council that two Latino/Latina and three African-American students were named funded minority fellows. In addition, two Latino/Latina and seven African-American students were awarded non-funded fellowships.

Council member Rodney Hero asked that the current practice of using APSA minority fellowships to attract higher external support which is then substituted for the APSA award be reconsidered in favor of distribution of the APSA awards. Discussion focused on whether the fellowship program best functioned as an identification program or a grants program.

Council decision and recommendation: The Council directed Woodard to assemble data showing the levels of external funding that APSA minority fellows have received over the course of the program. In addition, the Council requested data on the maximum level of university support for in-coming graduate students in the political science departments of the schools attended by the minority fellows. President-elect Jennings was authorized to name an ad hoc committee to review the minority fellowship program. Woodard will prepare the requested information for the committee's consideration.

It was further recommended that APSA look into the fellowship programs of the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society as a possible model for future program changes.

15. Centennial Campaign

Rob Hauck reported that the Officers of the Centennial Campaign had successfully recruited 74 members to the campaign's working group. Additional invitations have been extended and the campaign is awaiting responses. The campaign working group will be completed by November 1998.

As of August 22, 1997 members of the campaign working group have pledged \$329,922, 33% of the campaign goal of \$1,000,000, and approximately \$70,000 short of the interim goal of \$400,000 needed to be reached before the campaign is launched publicly.

The campaign working group was scheduled to meet during the 1997 Annual Meeting to review the broad purposes of the campaign and to plan for the Pacesetter phase of the campaign. The Pacesetter phase will be an appeal to the 2,700 APSA members most active in the Association over the past few decades.

The Council expressed its support for the campaign and its appreciation to those members who are giving of their time and financial support to make the fund-raising effort a success under the direction of campaign cochairs, Jack Peltason and Dale Rogers Marshall.

16. Other Matters

The Council reviewed the minutes and reports of many other APSA Committees that were provided for their information. No additional questions or matters were raised.

President-Elect Kent Jennings presented to outgoing President Ostrom a framed certificate and a print similar to one in APSA's Pendleton Herring Political Print Collection in recognition of her outstanding leadership of APSA during her 1996–97 presidential year.
