MINERS ON STRIKE
Class Solidarity and Division in Britain

When contrasted with their dramatic strike victories of 1972 and 1974, the shattering industrial defeat suffered by British miners in 1985 has been seen as evidence of the weakening of working-class solidarity. This book explains these strikes' differing outcomes and considers their implications for the current cohesiveness of organized labour in late industrial societies. The author argues, contrary to mainstream interpretations, that the strikes' differing outcomes illustrate the complexity rather than the disappearance of collective identity and class-consciousness among miners.

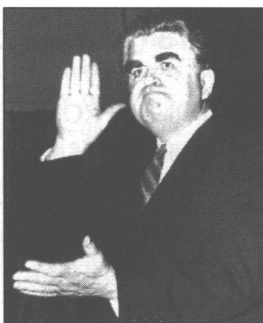

Maximum length of manuscripts: scholarly controversies, 35 pages including notes; substantive articles, 35 pages including notes; controversy critiques, 10 pages; review essays, 25 pages including notes; book reviews, 6 pages; reports, 6 pages; letters to the Editor, 3 pages.
