- 4. Footnotes must be numbered consecutively through the article and typed as a separate section at the end of the manuscript.
- 5. A submission of less than 4,000 words may be considered for the "Shorter Articles, Comments and Notes" section, which may secure earlier publication.

Authors are asked to refer to past issues of the I.C.L.Q. for style. More detailed guidance will be sent on request.
