OBITUARY

SIR JOHN WADDINGTON, G.B.E., K.C.M.G., K.C.V.O.

IT is with the deepest regret that we have to announce the death of our Chairman, Sir John Waddington, on 18 January 1957 after a long and distressing illness.

Sir John's honourable career in the British Colonial Service has received notice elsewhere, and mention has been made of those personal qualities which evoked the affection and respect of all who came in contact with him in that sphere. Here we would record the debt which the International African Institute owes to one who for nearly ten years exerted himself unstintingly to further its interests and assist its activities.

Sir John's close connexion with the Institute began in the spring of 1948, when he consented to become Chairman of the committee which organized the African Marriage Survey—a research study sponsored jointly by the International African Institute and the International Missionary Council. In October of the same year he accepted an invitation to serve on the Institute's Executive Council and in March 1949 the Council unanimously elected him as its Chairman in succession to Lord Rennell of Rodd, who had been obliged to resign that office on account of the pressure of other commitments. The new Chairman quickly endeared himself to all members of the Council, who recognized and appreciated the tact and sympathy, as well as the scrupulous fairness, with which he conducted its meetings and the affairs of the Institute generally. They were keenly sensible, also, of the great value and weight of the contributions which Sir John's wide experience during 19 years' service in Kenya and as Governor of Northern Rhodesia enabled him to make to the Council's deliberations.

The Officers and the staff of the London Office came to know the Chairman as a familiar friend, whose visits were always welcomed; they greatly valued his wise guidance and his conscientious participation in the detailed administration of the Institute's affairs.

We are confident that all our members will join with us in our deep sense of loss and in our profound sympathy with Lady Waddington and her sons.
