INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC ASSOCIATION

The Sixth World Congress of the International Economic Association will be held in Mexico City, August 4–9, 1980. The theme of the Congress is "Human Resources, Employment, and Development." Four main speakers will address the Congress in plenary session on the first day: Paul A. Samuelson, Josef Pajestka, Raúl Prebisch, and Shigeto Tsuru. Thereafter, six groups of specialized sessions will discuss various aspects of the following topics: 1) Human Resources: Concepts and Measurement (Organizer: Paul Streeten); 2) Human Resources and Employment in Developing Countries (Organizer: Samir Amin); 3) Human Resources and Employment in Developed Countries (Organizer: Burton A. Weisbrod); 4) International Economy and Employment (Organizer: Jagdish Bhagwati); 5) Human Resources in Long-term Perspective (Organizer: Harry Maier); 6) Employment and Development in Latin America (Organizer: Victor L. INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS OF HISTORICAL SCIENCES

The Fifteenth International Congress of Historical Sciences will take place in Bucharest, Rumania, August 17-22, 1980. The International Economic History Association has been allotted two half-day sessions in the program. Professor Z. P. Pach, Director of the Institute of History of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences and President of the International Economic History Association, is responsible for the IEHA sessions. The general theme will be "East-West Economic Relations from the Middle Ages to the Twentieth Century." In the first session, devoted to the pre-industrial period, Pierre Jeannin, of the Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Sciences Sociales (Paris), will present a general report on the interrelations of sea routes and land routes between Eastern and Western Europe in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. In the second session, devoted to the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, Ivan Behrend, Rector of the Karl Marx University in Budapest, and Georg Ranki, Co-director of the Institute of History of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, will present a general report on the effects of the industrial revolution in Western Europe on the economic development of Eastern and Southern Europe. In addition, there will be shorter papers on selected aspects of East-West economic relations.

BUDAPEST CONGRESS

The Eighth International Congress of Economic History will take place at the Semmelweis University of Medicine in Budapest, Hungary, August 16–22, 1982. As in recent congresses, the program will feature A, B, and C sessions. The themes, convenors, and rapporteurs of the A sessions are as follows:

- 1) Grand Domains and Small Proprietors; Herman Van der Wee, Leuven; L. Makkai, Budapest.
- 2) Protoindustrialization: Theory and Reality; Pierre Deyon, Lille; Franklin Mendels, University of Maryland-Baltimore County.
- 3) Technical Change, Investment, and Employment in Economic Growth; Lennart Jörberg, Lund; Nathan Rosenberg, Stanford.

In addition, there will be an open forum on "Famine in History" with J.-F. Bergier, Swiss Institute of Technology, Zurich, and Michael Drake, The Open University, London, as convenors.

There will be eleven B sessions with the following topics: 1) Economic Theory and History; 2) New Applications of Quantitative Methods; 3) Long-Period Movements in Economic History; 4) Patterns of Consumption in Economic Development; 5) Women in Economic History; 6) Typologies of Colonial Economic Development; 7) Comparative Studies of Agrarian Reforms; 8) Migrations and New Settlements to 1800; 9) From Family Firm to Professional Management: Structure and Performance; 10) Changing Patterns of Banking in the Industrial Period; 11) Ancient Economic History. The convenors of these sessions will be announced in the first circular for the Congress, to be published in the fall of 1979.

Provision has been made for thirty C sessions, but the topics have not yet been definitively decided. Scholars wishing to suggest a topic for these sessions should write to the Secretary General, M. Pierre Jeannin (Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Sciences Sociales, Centre de Recherches Historiques, 54, Boulevard Raspail, 75270 Paris, France) not later than March 1, 1980.

FELLOWSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

The Gladys Krieble Delmas Foundation announces its 1980-81 program of pre-doctoral and post-doctoral fellowships for Research in Venice, Italy. Applications will be entertained for grants from \$500 up to a maximum of \$10,000 for a full academic year. Funds will also be available eventually for aid in publication of studies resulting from research. Applicants must be citizens of the United States, have some experience in advanced research, and, if graduate students, have fulfilled all doctoral requirements except completion of the dissertation. Applications for grants must be received by January 15, 1980; fellows will be announced by April 1, 1980. The Columbia University Society of Fellows in the Humanities will appoint a number of post-doctoral fellows for the academic year 1980–81.
