We are pleased to announce the first number in the newly established Early China Special Monograph Series: *A Concordance of the Xiaotun Nandi Oracle-Bone Inscriptions*, by Cai Fangpei, Edward L. Shaughnessy and James F. Shaughnessy, Jr. This 375-page, computer-generated concordance includes both a transcription of the complete corpus of Xiaotun *nandi* oracle bones and a complete concordance, indexing each occurrence, together with the entire inscription in which it is found, of every lexical item in the transcription. One significant difference between this and previous oracle-bone concordances is that even such frequently occurring items as negatives, grammatical particles, technical divination terms and *ganzhi* day-designations are completely indexed, a feature that we believe will allow some statistical control to be brought to the analysis of these common words. The concordance is arranged according to the *Shuowen* radical system, as is traditional for reference works in Chinese paleography. Oracle-bone forms for which no *Shuowen* radical can be ascertained are listed in a separate chapter. Individual entries can also be located by means of a stroke-number index. A Specifications of Organization, in both English and Chinese, explains the organization and use of the concordance, and a preface discusses some of the significance of this corpus of inscriptions and also describes the manner in which the concordance was created.

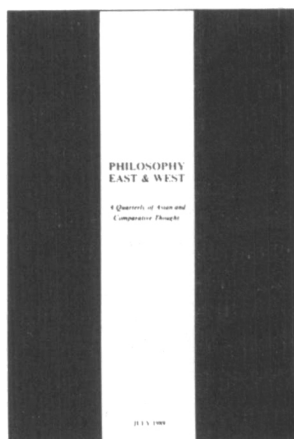
