

Disastro! Disasters in Italy since 1860: culture, politics and society.

**Friday 18 and Saturday 19 June 1999, Yale
University, New Haven, USA**

A two-day International Conference to be held at Yale University, organized by the Association for the Study of Modern Italy, the Department of History, Yale and the Department of Italian, Yale and *Modern Italy. The Journal of the Association for the Study of Modern Italy.*

There is no European society whose modern history has been more deeply marked by disasters, both natural and social, than has Italy's. The recent earthquakes have highlighted once again the geographical frailty of the peninsula. Italy is a land with active volcanoes, seismic zones from North to South (only Sardinia has been free of earthquakes) 1,000 miles of vulnerable coastline, river basins which flood frequently, forests which burn every Summer, land which is vulnerable to slips and snowfalls. Disease, both epidemic and endemic, from cholera and malaria to AIDS, has haunted Italy insistently. Italy has not been free of man-made disasters, such as the Vajont dam flood of 1963 (where over 2,000 people were killed) or the Seveso chemical leaks of 1976. Terrorism created its own traumatic disasters, such as at Piazza Fontana and Bologna Station. Military defeats—Custoza and Lissa, Dogali and Adowa, Caporetto and the Second World War—have sent profound shocks through Italian society. The 1990s saw landslips engulf whole towns near Naples, whilst thousands of prospective immigrants risked death on a daily basis attempting to reach Italy in flimsy craft.

The response to many of these tragic events can tell us much about Italy. Disasters test the social fabric and the political system to their limits; survival and re-building draw on the deepest cultural reserves. In the past, historians and social scientists have worked on these phenomena in isolation. This conference is the first attempt to bring together scholars whose research has encountered the diverse Italian experience of disaster from unification to the present day.
