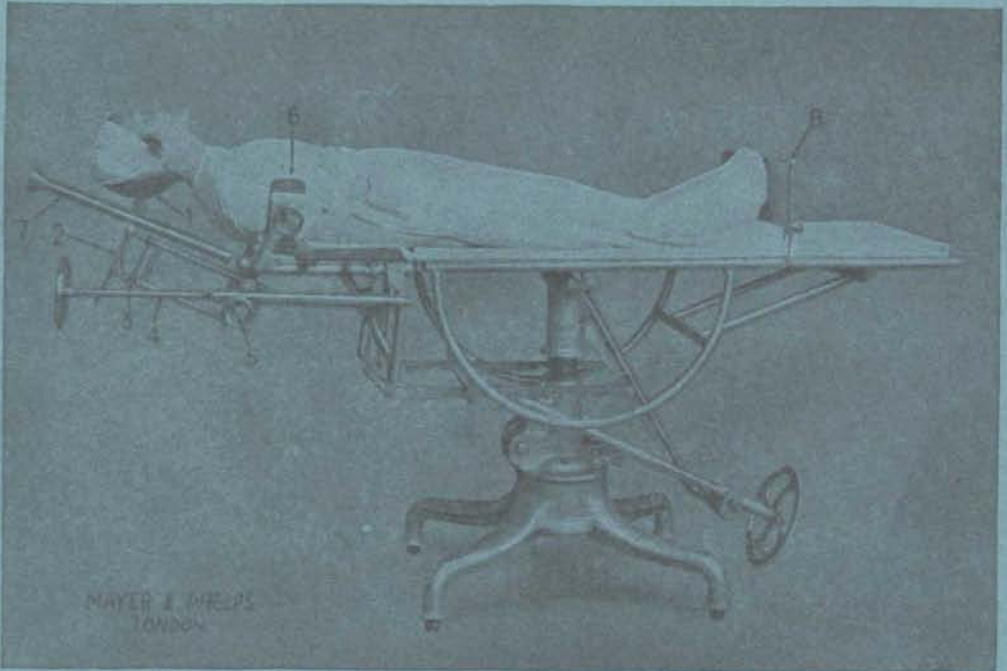
H. Mortimer Wharry, F.R.C.S.

The head rest enables the operator himself to place the patient in the desired position for a variety of operations. All parts touched by the operator are sterilisable.

The apparatus is an elaboration of Haslinger's Bronchoscopic head rest, but its range of utility is extended to enable the patient to be supported with the shoulders beyond the end of the table for œsophagoscopy, and to be kept in the correct attitude during operations performed in the sitting or semi-sitting position.
