The State Department, in a note signed by Lawrence Arthur, Chief of the Asylum Division of the Bureau of Human Rights and Humanitarian Affairs, has found no reason why Dennis Brutus could not return to England where his flight for refuge ended. While State recognizes Brutus' expressed fear of a return to Zimbabwe, it contends that he has a right to return to UK as a returning resident, and since he has not demonstrated any fear of persecution in that country, it recommends that he be so deported. In a statement issued 14 January, 1983, The Dennis Brutus Defense Committee promises further Motions to prevent the deportation. MARCUS GARVEY PAPERS TO BE PUBLISHED

Volumes I and II of the Main Series of the Marcus Garvey and the UNIA Papers will be published by the University of California Press in the fall of 1983. The first two volumes, which cover the periods 1826-August 1919 and August 1919-August 1920 respectively, contain rare documents (letters, speeches, vital records, investigative reports) and photographs describing the early years of the Garvey movement from its beginnings of 1914 in

Jamaica to its spectacular rise in postwar America. Volume III, which covers the August 1920-August 1921 period, will be of particular interest to Africanists, as the volume details many of the facts previously unknown to historians concerning the UNIA's negotiations for land in Liberia to carry out its plan for Afro-American immigration.
