

Modern Asian Studies was established on the initiative of the School of Oriental and African Studies (University of London), the Centre of South Asian Studies (University of Cambridge), the Centre for South East Asian Studies (University of Hull), The Department of Chinese Studies (University of Leeds), and the Centre of Japanese Studies (University of Sheffield).

Its concern is with modern Asian societies as seen from the standpoints of the several social sciences (including human geography and modern history) and it welcomes contributions not only from the universities but also from men of affairs.

In a geographical sense its primary interest lies in southern, south-eastern and eastern Asia, i.e. the arc of countries stretching from West Pakistan to Japan inclusive, but material extending beyond this range may be considered.

Editorial policy avoids commitment to any political viewpoint or ideology, but welcomes uninhibited discussion of such issues in the modern Asian context, on the understanding that all responsibility for opinions expressed rests exclusively with the author concerned and not with either the journal or its editor.
