THE GETTY CENTER FOR THE HISTORY OF ART AND THE HUMANITIES has announced the names of the eleven Getty scholars who will be in residence during the 1986–87 academic year. The scholars come from the United States (4), The Netherlands (2), West Germany (2), Switzerland, Australia, and Canada (1 each). Appointees include RSA Member Stephen Orgel (Stanford U), who will work on patronage in the history of the English Renaissance. In addition, three dissertation fellowships were awarded.

A CENTER FOR SHAKESPEARE STUDIES was established in Fall 1986 by the Folger Institute at the Folger Shakespeare Library. The new center received a grant of \$32,000 from the National Endowment for the Humanities in support of its activities. In its first academic year the Center will sponsor three seminars, four workshops, two public lectures and a summer institute. The seminars will be conducted by Patricia A. Parker (U of Toronto), Joseph H. Summers (U of Rochester), and Peter W. Blayney (Folger Lib.), in conjunction with the seminars of the Folger Institute. The 1987 summer institute for college and university professors will be directed by Michael Goldman (Princeton U) on the topic "Shakespeare's Texts in Action." With five visiting scholars, participants will explore the plays in the context of varied modes of performance and the possibility of new approaches arising from consideration of linguistic, textual, psychological, and other factors.

THE NEWBERRY LIBRARY CENTER FOR RENAISSANCE STUDIES announces that its 1987 Summer Institute will be on the "Theory and Practice of Sixteenth-Century Music." The program, co-directed by Profs.
