If such activities in the U.S. go unchallenged, then the sentiments on behalf of human rights expressed by our Congress in economic and military aid legislation become mere rhetoric. So the United States is not uninvolved with the actions of the KCIA, both at home and abroad—an involvement that takes on ever greater significance when we recognize that this Korean Central Intelligence Agency, as its name alone connotes, was established with the technical advice and financial assistance of our government."
