Statement of Editorial Policy

International Legal Materials, a flagship publication of the American Society of International Law, collects and reproduces the most significant documents representing the diverse nature of international law. These documents range from perennial international law topics such as nationality, jurisdiction, and maritime law, to contemporary developments such as environmental law, women's rights, and transborder electronic commerce.

International Legal Materials seeks to serve a global readership of legal scholars, government officials, and private practitioners who share a common interest in the law, consequently documents are selected on the basis of their present and future legal significance. Purely political or issue-advocacy documents are purposefully excluded, as are draft laws, unless they are part of an ongoing process of legal codification, such as the International Law Commission's Draft Articles on State Responsibility, or will soon appear in a final form which is substantially the same as the draft, such as the Kyoto Protocol to the Framework Convention on Climate Change.

International Legal Materials consciously serves a dual function — to inform readers about important trends in the law, and to provide a lasting archive of documents in a widely recognized and citable form. Most documents include a content summary permitting quick access to articles or sections within the text. In addition, many documents include an Introductory Note written by an expert in that area of the law. In order to ensure publication of materials at the forefront of international legal discourse, all documents are reproduced from the best available source, whether obtained electronically or in traditional printed form. Unless otherwise indicated, translations are unofficial and should not be considered authoritative.

International Legal Materials is compiled with the assistance of its Corresponding Editors and is collected and prepared for publication by a staff of attorney/editors acting with the advice of its Editorial Advisory Committee.

Volume XXXVII reflects advances in our method of production designed to help ensure timely publication and presents a new format designed to improve readability. A great deal of thought and care have been expended in providing the quality of publication you have grown to expect, while making use of technological advances that were simply not available when *ILM* debuted in 1962. We look forward to continuing to do our best for you.

Guidelines for Submission of Documents and Introductory Notes

Submission of Documents

Readers are invited to submit documents that would be of interest to the international legal community. *International Legal Materials* reproduces the official text of a document whenever possible; if the official version is not available in English, an unofficial translation is acceptable. The original language text must accompany unofficial English translations. The source of the document, e.g., a government department, a court, an embassy or an official gazette, should be clearly identified.

Submission of Introductory Notes

Readers are also invited to submit brief Introductory Notes to accompany documents in *I.L.M.* Introductory Notes are intended to provide background information for the document they accompany. They should be objective, without judgmental commentary. For example, Introductory Notes for treaties might include a short history of the negotiations, the dates of signature and entry into force; for legislation, its history and international significance; for judicial proceedings, the background of the case and a citation to the full text in the original language; for reports and other documents, background information as to the document's significance. If within the text of the document there are references to other documents, their relevance should be briefly explained in the Introductory Note.

Format

Introductory Notes should be between 750 and 1250 words in length. Both Introductory Notes and unofficial translations should be typed single-spaced with double-spacing between paragraphs. Authors and translators may send an additional copy of their submission on an IBM-compatible diskette. *I.L.M.* uses WordPerfect.

A statement giving the author's name, title, address, telephone and fax numbers must accompany all submissions.

Acceptance of Materials and Corrections

Submissions cannot be returned. Authors and translators will be notified of the acceptance of their Introductory Note or translation as soon as possible. Once a submission has been accepted for reproduction, the American Society of International Law will send the author or translator a Publication Agreement. Authors and translators will be acknowledged in *I.L.M.*

In some cases minor editorial or typographical alterations may be made without contacting author or translator. Major corrections will be sent to the author or translator for approval. Corrected Introductory Notes or translations should be returned as soon as possible.
