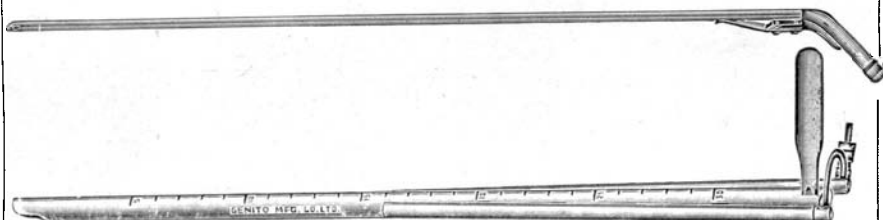

CLINICAL INSTRUCTION

Clinical instruction in the Diagnosis and Treatment of Diseases of the Ear, Nose and Throat is given in the Out-patient Department from 2 to 5 p.m. daily, and on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6 to 9 p.m. also. Major operations are performed every morning and afternoon, except Saturdays, in the In-patient Operating Theatres. Clinical Assistants, whose duty it is to assist the staff, are appointed as vacancies occur.

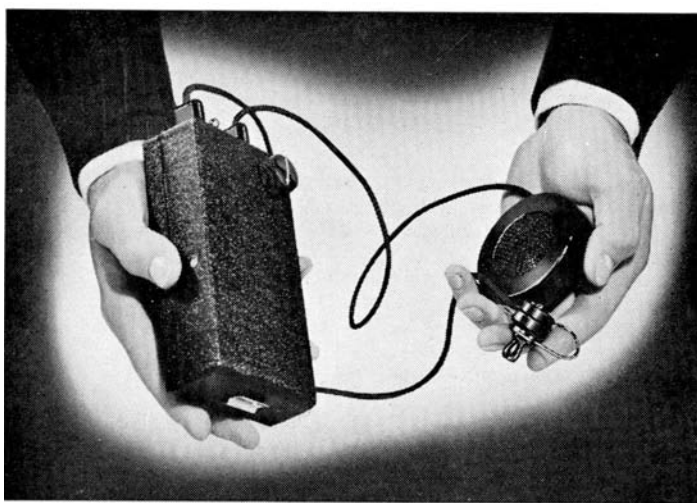

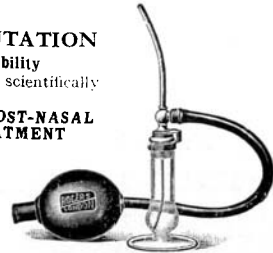
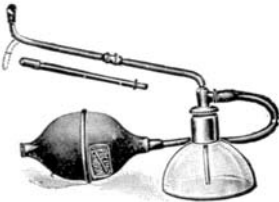
