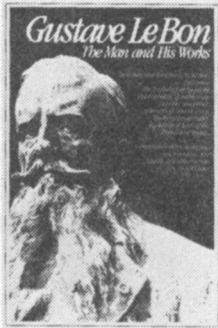

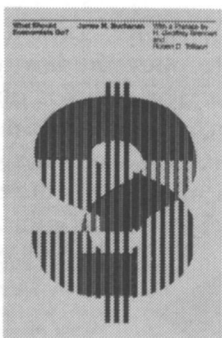

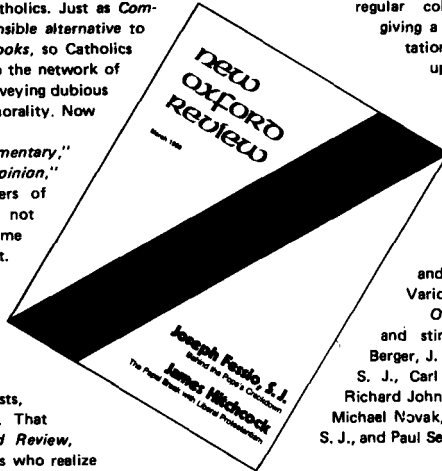
A current issue features a symposium on where and why Pope John Paul II should be supported by all orthodox Christians. Each contributor is a prominent non-Roman Catholic.
