GRANTS, AWARDS, PRIZES

Comprehensive listings and descriptions of postdoctoral fellowships that could be applied to research and study of the Latin American area may be found in at least two useful sources. The American Council on Education, in cooperation with the Council of Graduate Schools in the United States, prepares an annual edition of *Fellowships in the Arts and Sciences*, edited by Robert Quick. It may be obtained from the ACE, 1785 Massachusetts Ave., N.W., Washington, D.C. *Intercultural Education* is a new booklet published for the first time in September 1965 by Education and World Affairs. It is a compilation of fellowships available to faculty and students who wish to pursue intercultural or non-Western studies. Additional grants and awards of interest to the Latin American research community are noted below.

Conference on Latin American History Prizes

The Conference on Latin American History annually awards the James A. Robertson Memorial Prize of \$100 to the best article(s) appearing in the Hispanic American Historical Review that year. The Pan-American Foundation provides funds for the Herbert E. Bolton Memorial Prize of \$300, which is awarded annually for the best book on any aspect of Latin American history published during the previous year. The Conference on Latin American History Prize of \$100 is awarded each year for the best article on Latin American history appearing in a journal other than the HAHR. In cooperation with the American Historical Association, which administers the funds, a committee of Conference members appointed by the AHA recommends award of the Clarence H. Haring Memorial Prize every five years beginning in 1965 for the best historical work by a Latin American during the interval. The stipend varies. The Creole Foundation

The Creole Foundation Prize is awarded every two years in Caracas, Venezuela, to the author of a work dealing with subjects related to any aspect of Venezuela in the area of the natural, physical, or social sciences. Residents of any country may participate in the competition. The amount of the prize is \$10,000, a diploma, and a trip to Caracas for the ceremony of awards. Foreign Area Fellowship Support for Library Science

The Foreign Area Fellowship Program is now offering fellowships to outstanding graduate students or professional librarians who wish to do multidisciplinary graduate work related to a given geographic area, i.e., Latin America, and at the same time pursue a course of studies leading to a professional degree in library science. The number of persons who combine academic qualifications with professional librarianship is insufficient to fill the needs of the foreign area programs in institutions with major strength in area studies, and the FAFP hopes to correct the imbalance through these fellowships. Fulbright-Hays Lectureships and Research Awards

Major changes in arrangements for handling applications are being made this year in the Fulbright-Hays program for lecturing and research abroad during 1967–68. For positions in Latin America, lecturers and research scholars will be selected primarily through direct recruitment, although voluntary applications are also encouraged. The accelerated program schedule in effect this year is as follows: May 1—screening for lectureship begins, applications continue to be accepted, no final deadline for applying for lectureship grants; June 1—final deadline for applying for research grants. Notification to candidates of their nomination and final selection will also be accelerated, and the Committee on the International Exchange of Persons will begin choosing grantees for Latin America in the summer, especially for the countries where the academic year begins in March.

Applications will be accepted for an award for research to be conducted in Brazil from March–December 1967 in any area of Brazilian studies.

Fulbright-Hays lectureships in the social sciences (anthropology, economics, political science, and sociology), teaching of English as a second language, education, inter alia, are offered annually under most of the programs with countries of Central and South America. In almost all cases, the lectureships in the social sciences require candidates with a good to fluent speaking knowledge of Spanish. To assist in filling these openings for 1967–68 as well as planning for future years, the Conference Board Committee maintains a Register of Scholars consisting of biographic data on persons who have indicated interest in overseas lecturing appointments. Registration forms are available on request. Registration does not constitute an application or commit the registrant in any way.

The Fulbright-Hays program also makes a limited number of short-term awards for scholars to lecture for periods of three months or less. The awards are generally invitational, but scholars interested in lecturing in Latin America

should make their availability known to the Committee. Applications for grants covering round-trip travel for scholars whose maintenance is otherwise provided may be filed up to February 1, 1967, for the academic year 1967–68. HEW Support for Research and Related Activities in Education

The Bureau of Research of the Office of Education, U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, provides funds for research projects and programs designed to expand knowledge about the educational process, to develop new and improved educational programs and techniques, to disseminate the results of these efforts to educators and the public, and to train researchers in the field of education. The funds may be used outside the U.S. for research on cross cultural education, but the research must represent a contribution to American education. Individuals, institutions, public and private agencies are all eligible for project support. Applications may be submitted at any time, and proposals may be processed within three or four months, although larger or more complicated ones may require a longer period of time. Inter-American Press Association Fellowships

The IAPA will award at least five scholarships to North American newspapermen and journalism graduates or students for a year of study in Latin America. Scholarships do not exceed \$2,500, except in unusual cases involving higher travel and other costs. The deadline for accepting applications will fall between August 15 and September 1, 1966. Latin American Center for Research in the Social Sciences (CENTRO)

The CENTER offers graduates in the social sciences, particularly graduates of the Latin American Faculty of Social Sciences (FLACSO), one-year fellowships for further training. The fellows are expected to do full-time research under the direction of a member of the CENTER's research staff or as part of one of its research teams and must be willing to work in any Latin American country. The fellowship stipend varies between \$2,400 or \$3,000. Address inquiries and applications to the Directorate of the CENTER, Caixa Postal 12, ZC-02, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. There is no fixed date for the receipt of applications.

The University of New Mexico: Internships in Latin American Education

Under a grant from the Ford Foundation, The University of New Mexico has established a program of Internship in Latin American Education designed to provide a supply of educators competent to help in shaping strategies of educational development in Latin America. Exceptionally qualified persons with at least a Master's degree in education and a basic knowledge of Spanish or Portuguese are selected for 12 to 18 months tours of duty in educational agencies and institutions in Central and South America. Interns are paid \$600 per month (supplemented in certain high-cost areas), plus travel for themselves and their dependents, modest housing allowances, and University of New Mexico health and life insurance benefits. NDEA Center Faculty Awards

Fulbright-Hays awards are offered annually to faculty members affiliated with NDEA Language and Area Centers. Designed to enhance faculty capabilities in the language and area subjects with which the Center is concerned, the candidates must be active, full-time members of the Center faculty, have a Ph.D. or the equivalent, and have been engaged at least half-time for two years prior to the award period in teaching and/or research on the world region of Center concentration. The awards cover subsistence and travel for study and research abroad. To nominate a Center faculty member, the Center director must return the application forms, completed by the candidate and accompanied by the director's endorsement. Organization of American States: Fellowship and Professorship Programs

Fellowships for advanced study or training and for research are available to U.S. citizens and Latin Americans for use in any member state of the OAS, other than the candidate's own country. Applicants must have advanced training in the field of study for which the fellowship is requested and sufficient fluency in the language of the host country. Stipends cover transportation, tuition, and maintenance for a period of three months to two years. The two annual deadlines for advanced study or training fellowships are January 31 and July 31. Candidates for research fellowships must apply at least six months in advance of the date on which they propose to begin research. The OAS Professorship Program, at the request of interested institutions in the Organization, selects and defrays the expenses of a visiting professor who will begin the teaching of a new subject at the applicant institution. The financial conditions of the grants cover payment of the professor's and his wife's round-trip transportation as well as remuneration to the professor of up to \$1,000 per month. United States Office of Education

U.S. secondary school teachers or instructors or assistant professors at the college level who are also qualified to teach English, or teachers of English who are fluent in Spanish and who have had at least three years of teaching experience may apply for a limited number of teaching positions in Latin America. Interchange and one-way positions are available. Awards cover round-trip transportation and a maintenance allowance payable in foreign currency. The Braniff International Collection of South American Art
