On-line submission is welcomed of original articles which have not been published elsewhere and are not under consideration for publication elsewhere. (The fact that an article is already available as a working paper or discussion paper does not disqualify it from consideration by the ELRR). The journal accepts scholarly/research-based Articles (normally of 8,000 words or fewer), Review Articles discussing a number of significant recent publications in context (normally of 6,000 words or fewer), and shorter Book Reviews and Comments.

Submit your manuscript

Submissions should be made online via the ELRR's ScholarOne website, http://mc.manuscriptcentral. com/elrr (Please check that you do not have already have a ScholarOne account before opening a new one).

How to submit

Submission title page

Please provide a title page as a separate file. It should contain:

- 1. Title of submission
- 2. Type of submission
- 3. Names and institutional affiliations of all authors in the order desired
- 4. A two-sentence statement about each author
- 5. Email address/es for correspondence

Manuscript

- 1. Please ensure that the manuscript (Main Document) is in Word format, and does not contain the authors' names
- 2. All tables, charts and graphs should be clearly titled and numbered consecutively and included at the end of the text in the Main Document
- 3. Their captions should be outside the borders of tables charts or graphs. Sources must be specified below each table, chart or graph
- 4. The manuscript should include in-text indications of where any tables and graphs should be located

- 5. If you use acronyms and abbreviations, use the full title the first time, followed by the acronym in brackets
- 6. Mathematical notation should be provided in both symbols and words. Articles of a mathematical nature should also contain a clear statement of the arguments in plain English, with substantial amounts of mathematical material placed in an appendix
- 7. Quotations of four or more lines should be indented. Shorter quotes should be placed in the body of the text
- 8. Endnotes, which should be kept to a minimum, should be numbered serially and included at the end of the article
- 9. Please upload Excel files of all tables, graphs and charts in a separate document in case reformatting is needed for legibility
- 10. A references list at the end of the text should cite all works referred to, listing them in alphabetical order by author
- 11. Please use the style illustrated by the examples below
