Psychology does have a number of differing approaches each having different levels of explanation. Hopefully the shortcomings of the approaches are apparent to their protagonists. Indeed Joynson does not deal with all the arguments concerning whats wrong with psychology at the present. Perhaps he is keeping the implications of these shortcomings for his next book which would be an interesting and logical extension of his present work. The more approaches there are, the better off we are, providing we remain open to all the possibilities.

In conclusion then Joynson's book is extremely thought-provoking, well-written and highlights several key issues. Despite my comments I do believe that psychologists need to be kept on their toes and it is just the sort of book that will put them there.

DANISH BEHAVIOUR THERAPY ASSOCIATION

The newly formed Danish Behaviour Therapy Association held its first open meeting on 17th March, 1975, at the University of Copenhagen. The initial focus of this group is to unite psychologists, psychiatrists, educators and others with interest in behaviour therapy, and to attempt to provide them with training programmes and international contacts in the area of behaviour therapy.
