Congressional Fellowship Program

The Association has announced eight winners in the national competition for the 1981-82 Congressional Fellowship Program.

The winners—four political scientists and four journalists—will come to the Nation's Capital for a year of full-time work in the offices of Senators and members of the House of Representatives.

Sponsored by the Association since 1953, the purpose of the Congressional Fellowship Program is to give outstanding young academicians and political journalists an opportunity to further their knowledge of the national legislative process. Other participants in the 1981-82 Congressional Fellowship Program, Asian Fellows, Harkness Fellows, Anthropological Fellows, Johnson Health Policy Fellows, and Federal Service Fellows, will be named later in the year.

The Congressional Fellows are scheduled to arrive here in early November for a three-week orientation period. They will begin working in congressional offices of their choice about December 1, 1981. The Program ends August 15, 1982.

The eight winners were selected on the basis of superior academic training and experience.
