SOVIET-CUBAN ALLIANCE: 1959-1991

Yuri Pavlov ISBN 1-56000-691-9, 1994/288 pp, paper/\$22.95

During the Cuban Missile Crisis in 1962, Yuri Pavlov interpreted for Nikita Khrushchev. In 1982, he was appointed Soviet Ambassador to Costa Rica, and in 1987, he became head of the Foreign Ministry's Latin American Directorate and was responsible for Soviet-Cuban bilateral relations. Pavlov draws upon these experiences to give both a personal and a political account of the history of the Soviet-Cuban alliance and speculates about the future relationship between Cuba and Russia.

Pavlov believes that the two nations became allies only as a result of the Cold War; when this period passed into history, the Soviet Union no longer needed nor could it afford Cuba's dependent relationship, which had become ruinous economically and embarrassing politically. The disintegration of the Soviet Union only accelerated, and finally completed, the process of separation. Pavlov provides the first eyewitness appraisal of the history of this alliance, as well as important insights into the

current confused and contradictory Russian policy toward Cuba.

Yuri Pavlov, a veteran officer of the former Soviet Foreign Service, has had extensive experience in international and Latin American affairs. He is now a visiting scholar in international studies at Oregon State University, Corvallis.

CUBA 1993: STUDENTS, YANKEES, AND SOLDIERS

Justo Carrillo ISBN 1-56000-690-0, 1994/440 pages, paper/\$24.95

On September 4, 1933, a sergeant with a pistol took over the office of the Cuban army's chief of staff and promoted himself to colonel, thus beginning a stormy period of Cuban history that would end only with the rise of Fidel Castro. This first-person testimony offers previously unavailable insights and information on that decisive period of Cuba's history. Justo Carrillo analyzes the failure of various opposition organizations to stand against the betrayal of the people, leaving the Directorio Estudiantil Universitario (DEU), the University of Havana student government



organization, alone to defend the liberties wrested from Spain. Carrillo shows how the Cuban people were frequently manipulated by tyrants previous to Fidel Castro. The text is illustrated by photographs and historical documents.

Justo Carrillo was a leading member of the DEU. He distinguished himself in the revolutionary struggles of the 1930s against the Machado dictatorship and became a respected public figure during the late 1940s.
