David Price, former professor of political science at Duke University, is running for reelection as congressman of North Carolina's 4th District.

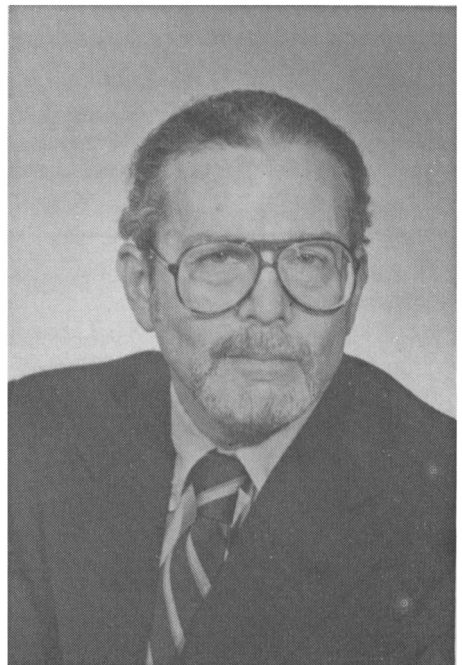
David Rohde, Michigan State University, will be the editor of the *American Journal of Political Science* for the 1989-91 term.

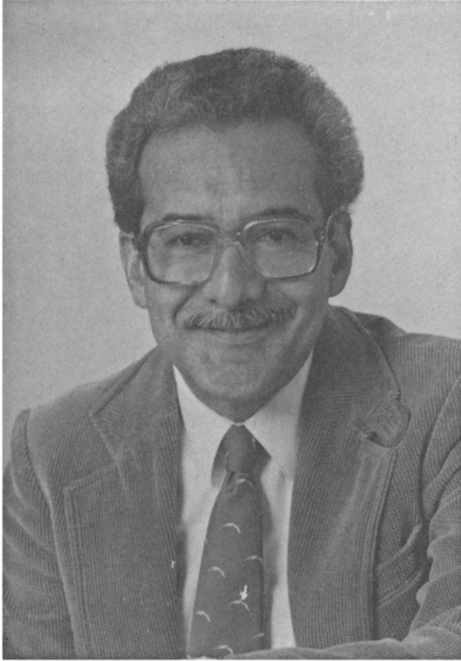
