Notes should be grouped together at end of manuscript and should conform to models in the *Chicago Manual of Style*, 13th ed. If manuscript is prepared on computer, please include a 5¼" or 3½" diskette in WordStar, WordPerfect, or ASCII format. Maximum length of manuscripts: scholarly controversies, 9,000 words including notes; substantive articles, 9,000 words including notes; thematic essays, 6,000 words including notes; controversy critiques, 2,500 words; review essays, 5,000 words; book reviews, 1,000 words; reports, 1,000 words; letters to the Editor, 750 words.
