What scientific observations is Bede likely to have brought to bear on the Easter controversy? What interest did the Anglo-Saxons take in precious stones and what did they know about them? Are heroic values rejected in one of Cynewulf's poems? What was Anglo-Saxon carpentry like? These are among the questions taken up in this volume. Some of the answers involve one form of evidence solving a puzzle presented by another; some involve collaboration between several disciplines in large-scale, many-sided undertakings, such as investigating the origins of a city or systematically studying a whole class of manuscripts.

Observations to determine the day of the equinox in Bede's Northumbria; Anglo-Saxon lapidary knowledge (particularly in the Old English Lapidary, the earliest in any western European vernacular) as part of the medical and exegetic traditions of early medieval Europe; lists of saints' resting-places as an aspect of the cult of saints in the intellectual and social life of Anglo-Saxon England; the symbolism of the Pacx/Pax/ Paxs coin legend; the construction of some wooden roofs, walls, floors, window-frames, doors and, especially, the frame of a spire, likely to be Anglo-Saxon: these topics are subjected to keen examination - the last a hitherto completely neglected line of enquiry. The excavations carried out in the present decade to test key hypotheses about the Anglo-Saxon origins of Norwich are described, and the composite picture they have yielded so far is assessed. The rôle of units, independent in content and structure, within manuscripts of vernacular homilies is discussed; so, too, is the present state of combined palaeographical, codicological, art historical and textual study of manuscripts containing English decoration from the reign of Alfred to the Norman Conquest. In the field of vernacular poetry there
