Depending on the type of contract offered, other benefits may include: provident fund benefits or an end-of-contract gratuity, a settling-in allowance of \$\$1,000 or \$\$2,000, subsidised housing at nominal rentals ranging from \$\$100 to \$\$216 p.m., education allowance for up to three children subject to a maximum of \$\$10,000 per annum per child, passage assistance and baggage allowance for the transportation of personal effects to Singapore. Staff members may undertake consultation work, subject to the approval of the University, and retain consultation fees up to a maximum of 60% of their gross annual emoluments in a calendar year.

The Department of Chinese Studies is a department in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. There are 8 faculties in the National University of Singapore with a current student enrolment of some 14,000. All departments are well-equipped with a wide range of facilities for teaching and research.

In addition, a proposed campus network based on state-of-the-art optical fibre technology will be installed by the end of 1990 to facilitate resource sharing and electronic communication for the academic community.


