### **Graduate Study Guide Now Available from APSA**

The tenth edition of the *Guide to Graduate Study in Political Science* (1982) is

now available from the National Office, according to editor Jean Walen.

The *Guide* describes nearly 300 Ph.D. and M.A. programs in political science. The listing of each program includes information about field specializations, tuition charges, and financial aid, and admission and degree requirements. In addition, the entire faculty of each department with a graduate program in political science is identified along with their fields of specialization, highest degree, and current position.

The purpose of the *Guide* is to provide students and teachers with a concise summary of graduate programs in political science. Students who are interested in a particular field can determine from the lists of faculty and program descriptions which political science departments offer such a specialization, what the requirements for admission to various programs are, and what kinds of financial assistance are available.

The information on which the *Guide* is based was collected in September and October, 1981, directly from political

### APSA Offers SETUPS On 1980 Election

C. Anthony Broh and Charles L. Prysby have developed a new instructional unit entitled, *Voting Behavior: The 1980 Election*. This APSA publication is the most recent in the series of Supplementary Empirical Teaching Units in Political Science (SETUPS) which introduce social science students to data analysis in the fields of American and cross-national politics.

SETUPS were initiated with the support of grants from the National Science Foundation. Each unit in the series includes a monograph and a data set for analysis by students. The data are supplied by the Inter-University Consortium for Political and Social Research (ICPSR). The Broh and Prysby unit uses data from the 1980 National Election Study by the Center for Political Studies at the University of Michigan.

SETUPS monographs can be ordered through APSA. Accompanying data are provided by ICPSR and are available without charge for each order of 25 or more of any one of the monographs in the SETUPS series. The new *Voting Behavior* monograph is available at \$5 per copy with a 20 percent discount for orders of 25 or more and with a shipping charge.

### Renamed Parties Subfield Plans Panel for Fall Meeting

Parties and Other Political Organizations, a continuing subfield of the APSA, has been renamed "Political Organizations/Parties" to produce the more sober acronym, POP. The group, which has been in existence only since 1979, will sponsor another special event at the 1982 APSA Convention.

This will be a Roundtable on "Political Organization Theory: New Developments." It will be chaired by Kay Lawson (San Francisco State) and will feature presentations by Kenneth Janda (Northwestern), Andrew Nathan (Columbia), and Wayne Peak (Colorado State) on their research into political organizations.

The participants will address these questions: What advances have they proposed in political organization theory? What problems do they face that merit further work? What problems have not been addressed by the authors that need attention? Students of political organizations are urged to attend and participate in the discussion. □
