INSTITUTE OF AFRICAN STUDIES, FOURAH BAY COLLEGE, UNIVERSITY OF SIERRA LEONE

Team Research: The Kono Road Project is an interdisciplinary investigation funded by Fourah Bay College. The objective of the study is to discover the effects of a major new highway which runs through the central and eastern parts of Sierra Leone. Faculty members from the departments of history, economics, geography, demography, political science and sociology will be investigating effects at the local, regional, and national levels.

On November 17, 1973, the President of the United Republic of Cameroon inaugurated the new buildings of the Cameroonian Institute of International Relations. The Institute will serve as a center for professional training at the University of Yaounde, and as an international institute which will focus on the scientific study of international relations. Research will be conducted on economic, diplomatic, political, and financial questions among African countries and between Africa and the world.
